## **Narrative Medicine for Non-Narratival Subjectivities**

Narrative medicine has grown to its current intellectual and academic stature within the medical humanities due to the power of its central thesis: that illnesses are narratival experiences and should be analyzed and treated as such. However, narrative medicine's emphasis on co-constructing patient stories runs into difficulty when applied to patients whose subjectivities are not explicitly narratival. This presentation aims to broaden the concept of illness narratives and thus expand the narrative medicine field to include non-narratival subjectivities by introducing the concept of a spectrum of narrativity. Utilizing the recently proposed Double Helix Model as a scaffold for narratively engaging with these non-narrativistic subjectivities, this presentation aims to make narrative medicine a more inclusive space for these often-marginalized communities.



Liam Butchart, MD, MA, is currently chief resident physician in psychiatry at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai—Morningside/West program (New York, NY). He graduated from the Stony Brook University Renaissance School of Medicine and received his MA in Medical Humanities, Compassionate Care, and Bioethics from Stony Brook University. His research interests include psychoanalysis and literature, medical humanities, bioethics, and narrative medicine.
